LEWISTOWN - The outpouring of support for the victims of the Juniata Terrace fire has been tremendous. What the community now needs to start thinking about is long term plans to help those who

Marie Mulvihill, executive director of the Mifflin-Juniata United Way, said the immediate needs of the fire victims were meet by the Red Cross, and what these people really need now is to find housing.

"Only four households needed the support of hotels that first initial night. Everyone else was able to stay with friends or family," Mulvihill said. "However, that is only a temporary solution, they cannot stay with them forever."

Mulvihill said to help with longterm recovery, residents are being encouraged to support the victims with monetary donations through the Juniata Valley Bank. Many of the residents who have been displaced are from working-class families, and all have varying needs when it comes to what was lost. She also said that the United Way has partnered with the American Red Cross and Goodwill. Mulvihill believes that those displaced simply want to get back to normalcy and the JVB account is starting to help with that.

AP photographer killed, reporter hurt in Afghanistan

Afghan police commander opened fire fer of power. Friday on two Associated Press journalists, killing Pulitzer Prize-winning photographer Anja Niedringhaus and wounding veteran correspondent Kathy Gannon – the first known case of a security insider attacking journalists in Afghanistan.

Niedringhaus, 48, who had covered conflict zones from the Balkans in the 1990s to Iraq, Libya and Afghanistan, died instantly of her wounds.
